

Note: This factsheet reflects the state fiscal year 2020 status of Missouri's Medicaid program. Medicaid expansion is not scheduled to take effect until July 2021.

What is Medicaid?

Missouri's Medicaid program (MO HealthNet) provides health insurance for low-income children and parents, seniors, pregnant women, and people with disabilities. It allows Missourians to see a doctor when they are sick, get checkups, buy medications, and go to the hospital. Having health insurance allows Missourians to maintain their health, go to work, and take care of their families.

Who is enrolled in MO HealthNet?

Many different types of people are covered, though most enrollees are kids.



Eligible groups include parents, children, pregnant women, seniors, and persons who are blind or disabled.



Missouri currently has some of the strictest eligibility requirements in the country.

A non-disabled adult with children will qualify if their income is **below 21% of the federal poverty line.** This means a family of four must earn **less than \$5,550** a year.

Adults who are not parents are not eligible, regardless of income.

Across the state, MO HealthNet:



Covers 1 out of every 7 people





Covers more than **1/3** of all children



Pays for **2/3** of the cost of nursing home care

Families and children use fewer resources.






How is MO HealthNet financed?

How has COVID-19 impacted enrollment?

More Missourians are eligible for coverage due to the pandemic and its economic impact.

Enrollment increased by 17% during the first nine months of the pandemic (January-September 2020).

COVID-19 Enrollment Growth by Eligibility Group (January-September 2020)

Older Adults	5.4%
Custodial Parents	24.2%
Pregnant Women	76.6%
Children (CHIP and Medicaid)	17.2%

During the public health emergency, the federal government has increased its share of financing to offset the costs of increased enrollment.

As a condition of receiving these temporary enhanced funds, states may not remove anyone from the Medicaid rolls, accounting for much of the increase in the table above.
