Missouri Foundation for Health (MFH) invites organizations to submit concept papers for systems change projects that will positively impact the health of Missourians. We are interested in community-driven work that challenges and disrupts inequitable systems.

How we define systems change:

Systems change requires addressing the root causes that hold social problems in place. This intentional process focuses on transforming and disrupting the deeply embedded systems and structures that enable the status quo.

MFH also <u>created a video</u> to explore this definition.

The figure below highlights some of the common components of systems that can be targeted by systems change work:

The goal of this systems change work is to improve health equity in the state. Health equity means that everyone has a fair and just opportunity to be as healthy as possible. To achieve health equity, obstacles to health such as poverty, discrimination, and their consequences, including a lack of access to good jobs with fair pay, quality education and housing, safe environments, and health care must be removed.

Reviewers evaluate concept papers based on the following criteria. Successful projects often include at least two of these elements:

- Far-reaching: Focuses on broad impact that extends beyond one organization's client base
- <u>Community-informed</u>: Generates solutions that engage those negatively impacted by the issue (Work that moves beyond engagement toward being led or driven by community is preferred)
- <u>Timely</u>: Addresses an issue that has recently surfaced in the environment (or exists in a recently changed context) with a systems approach
- <u>Connected</u>: Creates or builds on existing collaborative networks and fits within the broader landscape of what other organizations are doing to address the issue
- Strategic: Develops internal or sector-wide planning and preparation efforts focused on systems change
- Innovative: Tests unconventional and creative approaches to disrupt systems

Projects that meet the "far-reaching" criteria are much more likely to be be invited for a full proposal. It is not necessary or expected for any one project to meet all the elements listed above.

Eligibility Requirements

Applicants must be nonprofit or governmental entities and meet the general <u>MFH funding guidelines</u> available on the Foundation's website.

Applicants may apply with a <u>fiscal sponsor</u>. (Additional information about your fiscal sponsor will be requested if your organization is asked to submit a full proposal.)

Application Timeline

Concept Papers: Concept papers must be received by **Tuesday, April 30, 2024, at noon (CT)**. Please plan accordingly and submit your application well before the deadline, as MFH cannot accept late applications.

Full Proposal: MFH staff will review concept papers to determine if the organization will be invited to submit a full proposal based on fit with the Opportunity Fund and strategic priorities of the Foundation. Applicants will be notified of concept paper status in late June 2024. If an applicant is invited, they will have about 10 weeks from the date of invitation to submit a full proposal. During this period, chosen applicants will also have the opportunity to chat with MFH staff to address questions and concerns.

Concept Paper Requirements

- Application Acknowledgement. Complete and submit the one-page acknowledgement form.
- **Concept Paper Narrative.** In no more than two, 1.5-spaced pages, please concisely consider the following: (*Note: If invited to submit a full proposal, additional details about the approach, major activities, timeline, organizational history, and partner roles will be requested.*)
 - 1. <u>Introduction</u>: Provide a brief summary of what you hope to accomplish through the proposed project, the systems approach, the population that will be impacted, and how that population will be engaged.
 - 2. <u>Why?</u> Why is this project needed to improve health equity in Missouri? Why is now the time to address this topic? Why is your organization well positioned to address this systemic challenge? (We are more interested in the needs of your local community rather than national trends.)
 - *3.* <u>*How?*</u> How will you know if this work is successful? How will this project challenge systems to improve health equity? Systems change can take shape at many different levels <u>please see the conditions</u> referenced in the graphic above. (We encourage you to prioritize this section. Proposals with clear pathways to more equitable outcomes are more likely to be invited to submit full proposals.)
 - 4. <u>With whom?</u> Collaboration and partnerships are essential for systems-level impact. Please share any identified partners and describe your level of engagement with them, their level of commitment, and willingness to sign a memorandum of understanding (MOU) for those central to the project.
- **Concept Budget.** Please complete and submit the <u>concept paper budget</u>. The budget should include the estimated expenses for the total duration of the project with a brief explanation for each expense. The brief explanation is helpful as additional context to your concept narrative. A more detailed budget will be required if a full proposal is requested. <u>If your request is a multi-year project, please provide a multi-year estimated budget</u>.
- Annual audit report or IRS Form 990. Most recent audit report or IRS Form 990.
- **Conflict of Interest Disclosure.** Complete and submit the disclosure form.

Additional Considerations

The Foundation reserves the right to:

- Request additional information from any or all applicants
- Conduct discussions with applicants to ensure full understanding of, and responsiveness to, the application requirements
- Request modifications to a respondent's application prior to final award to ensure alignment of project elements with the <u>core values</u>, <u>mission</u>, and operating standards of the Foundation
- Approve subcontractors proposed or used in carrying out the work
- Reject any or all applications submitted
